India is ranked 66th out of 195 countries with a composite index score of 42.8 as well with a change of -0.8 from 2019. The United States of America (USA) ranks first in the index with a score of 75.9, followed by Australia and Finland.

'Health in India (2020) According to the 'Health in India' report published by the National Statistics Office (NSO), two out of five children in India do not complete their immunization schedule. are vulnerable against tuberculosis and partly against other diseases. Less than half of the children in the nation's capital have been given all eight required vaccines, although almost all children in India are receiving the tuberculosis and polio vaccines. Only 59.2 percent of children under the age of five are fully immunized. This figure shows a stark contrast from the data available on the central government's Health Management Information System portal, which claimed that the full immunization coverage for the financial year 2017-18 was 86.7 per cent.

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NHM (2020) According to the National Health Mission, the highest amount of money for health in Gujarat is given to Vadodara city. 380 crore was allocated to Vadodara city in 2020. After that Gandhinagar was allotted Rs 295 Crore. Thus 18500 crore was allocated for health in Gujarat.

### Methodology

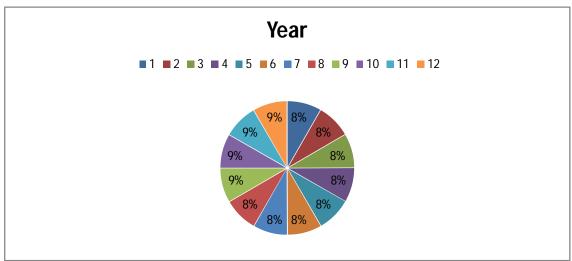

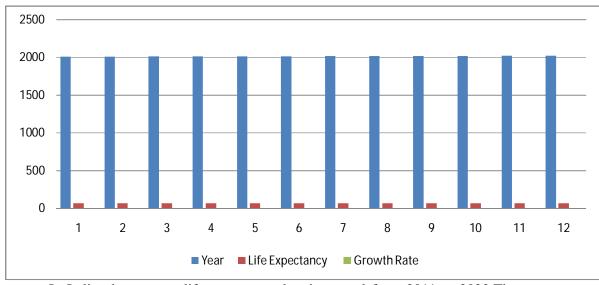

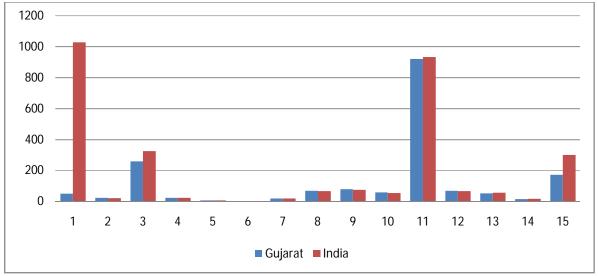
